

Authorial Intention: _____ Reader Response: _____ Textuality: _____ "The autonomy of the text is the condition of its 'surplus' of meaning, that is, of its transcending its original situation and having something to say to readers in the present." – (Kevin Vanhoozer, *Is There a Meaning in This Text?*, 107) "A text has only potential meaning until a reader 'awakens' and makes sense of it." -(Kevin Vanhoozer, *Is There a Meaning in This Text?*, 108) **Different Types/Levels of Meaning** Literal vs. Allegorical **John Chrysostom of Antioch (c. 347-407)** – "We must not examine the words as bare words, else many absurdities will follow, but we must mark the mind of the writer." **Martin Luther (1483-1546)** – "I consider the ascription of several senses to Scripture to be not merely dangerous and useless for teaching but even to cancel the authority of Scripture whose meaning ought always to be one and the same." Determine The Theological Principle (The Timeless Meaning in Context)

- The principle should be reflected in the text.
- The principle should be timeless and not tied to a specific situation.
- The principle should not be culturally bound.
- The principle should correspond to the teaching of the rest of Scripture.
- The principle should be relevant to both the biblical audience and the contemporary audience.
