## The Mission of the Church: The Modern Missions Movement

William Carey (1761-1834)

Enquiry into the Obligation of Christians to Use Means for the Conversion of the Heaven (1791)

"Our Lord Jesus Christ, a little before his departure, commissioned his disciples to Go, and teach all nations; or, as another evangelist expresses it, Go into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature. This commission was as extensive as possible, and laid them under obligation to disperse themselves into every country of the habitable globe, and preach to all the inhabitants, without exception, or limitation."

## Restorationism: A Response to the Second Great Awakening

Alexander Campbell (1788-1866), Walter Scott (1796-1861), and Barton Stone (1772-1844) formed a denomination called Disciples of Christ. "This group attempted to displace denominational divides with an emphasis on Christian unity based on New Testament teaching, leaving creeds and confessions aside. They rejected the lengthy, overly emotional conversion narratives of the Awakening and opted for a straightforward soteriology that they deemed understandable..." (Kimble, *Historical Theology*, 343).
