### **Biblical Observations on Marriage**

Ephesians 5:22-28 – (22) Wives, submit to your own husbands, as to the Lord. (23) For the husband is the head of the wife even as Christ is the head of the church, his body, and is himself its Savior. (24) Now as the church submits to Christ, so also wives should submit in everything to their husbands. (25) Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her, (26) that he might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word, (27) so that he might present the church to himself in splendor, without spot or wrinkle or any such thing, that she might be holy and without blemish. (28) In the same way husbands should love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. (29) For no one ever hated his own flesh, but nourishes and cherishes it, just as Christ does the church, (30) because we are members of his body. (31) Therefore a man shall leave his father and mother and hold fast to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh. (32) This mystery is profound, and I am saying that it refers to Christ and the church.

What does this passage teach us about God and what He says about marriage?			
Special Positions to Consider on the Nature of Marriage			
1. Marriage as a Sacrament			
Sacramentum is the Latin term used by Jerome in the fourth-century Vugate to translate the Greek expression mysterion ("mystery"), which describes the analogy between marriage and the union of Christ and the church in Ephesians 5:32." <sup>1</sup>			
The Sacramental model today suggests the marriage is a church rite that brings about effectual			
grace for the married couple. It supposes that God grace through the church			
and in the sacrament.			
Roots marriage in law.			
2. Marriage as a Contract			
Gary Chapman lists five characteristics of contracts. <sup>2</sup>			
<ol> <li>They are typically made for a limited period of time.</li> </ol>			
2. They most often deal with specific actions.			
3. They are conditional upon the continued performance of contractual obligations by the other partner.			
4. They are entered into for one's own benefit.			
5. They are sometimes unspoken and implicit.

## 3. Marriage as a Covenant

Definition: "This position defines marriage as a sacred bond between a man and a woman instituted by and publicly entered into before God (whether or not this is acknowledged by the married couple), normally consummated by sexual intercourse."

Malachi 2:14 – "Because the Lord was witness between you and the wife of your youth, to whom you have been faithless, though she is your companion and your wife by covenant."

 $\it Matthew~19:6-$  "So they are no longer two but one flesh. What therefore God has joined together, let not man separate."

Roots marriage in \_\_\_\_\_law. (The authoritative divine revelation found in Scripture).

Under this covenant position on the nature of marriage, how does should our theological reflection on the nature of marriage begin with God, remain with God, and end with God?

What it means to fall in love: "It is to look at another person and get a glimpse of the person God is creating, and to say, 'I see who God is making you, and it excites me! I want to be part of that. I want to partner with you and God in the journey you are taking to his throne." <sup>4</sup>
